

Hospital district to host annual health fair Sat.

East Phillips County Hospital District will host its annual health fair Saturday, March 24 from 9 a.m.-noon at Holyoke High School.

Those who had their blood drawn will be able to pick up their lab results and visit with a provider about them that day. Clinicians will be present to help with lab results.

Also, those who haven't had their blood drawn will be able to do so on Saturday. Those planning to do so need to fast for 12 hours before the test. Results will not be available on the same day but can be picked up later at the hospital.

MMH Human Resources director Sharon Greenman said 611 people had their blood drawn during early blood draws.

In addition, providers will be on hand to offer hearing screenings, height, weight, blood pressure and body fat analysis and screenings for anxiety and depression as well as for peripheral vascular disease.

Early Childhood Council of Logan, Phillips and Sedgwick counties (ECCLPS) will be on hand providing oral health screenings and fluoride treatments.

Numerous educational booths and stations will also be set up providing more information and giveaways.

Linda Staples, registered dietician and diabetes educator, will be on hand for question and answer periods. Discussion times will be held at 9:15, 10:15 and 11:15 a.m.

Holyoke Lions Club members will have a box and will be collecting old pairs of glasses.
