Citizen Washington Focus (CWF) is an annual event for 4-H members from around the country. On Stewart's trip there were members from Colorado, Mississippi, Iowa and Wisconsin. Throughout the summer, other states will visit Washington for their CWF.

One 4-H member from each county is chosen to attend. Stewart applied earlier this year through the extension office, and was chosen as this year's Phillips County attendee. After spending months corresponding with trip leaders and preparing to travel to the capital, CWF far exceeded Stewart's expectations.

While in D.C. students participated in a combination of sightseeing and educational events. On the sightseeing end of things, Stewart commented on how amazing it was to see so many of the country's prominent memorials. Her favorite was the Holocaust Memorial. While it was a sad atmosphere, Stewart was glad to see the people being honored. One quotation in particular has stuck with her in the weeks since the tour: "For the dead and the living, we must bear witness."

Other memorable sights were the Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, Iwo Jima, Arlington National Cemetery, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and Library of Congress.

Equally interesting, said Stewart, were the leadership workshops the students participated in. In one, students learned to write and pass a bill. Learning to write a bill in formal terms was one of the more enlightening aspects for Stewart, and having never had such an experience, she really enjoyed discussing relevant issues such as gun rights and ethanol.
