HHS senior Alex Quintana single-handedly scored 33 points to earn the HHS boys' track team a fifth-place finish at the Colorado State 2A Track & Field Championships May 17-19.

Quintana fulfilled his ultimate goal of winning a gold medal, which he accomplished in his last race of the meet, the 300 meter hurdles.

Additionally, his goal of placing in the top three in all four of his events was conquered.

Quintana was runner-up in both the 800 meter run and the 110 meter hurdles and placed third in the 400 meter run.

On an even sweeter note for the HHS Dragon headed to Mesa State University to run track next year, personal best times were achieved in all four of his events at the state meet.

"I wanted the gold medal badly," admitted Quintana after winning the 300 hurdle event.

He ran his 110 hurdles in drizzling rain, but clocked a personal best of :15.49 to place second.

It was raining even harder when the gun sounded to start his 400 meter final Saturday around noon. Quintana finished third in :50.42. His :50.00 in the prelims was a PB in the 400 meter race.

Over two hours later when Quintana entered the blocks for his final race, the sun was shining.

His :39.83 in the 300 meter hurdles was not only a gold-medal effort, but a personal best, as well.

Quintana was quick to acknowledge his coaches for helping him keep his eye on the gold medal. He expressed appreciation to his coaches, teammates and family for their support.


The team ran their best time of the season, clocking a 9:07.64 to finish 15th in the field of 18.
